## Beta **Brothers Awarded** Scholarships



# Treasurer's Report House Finances Remain Stable

The Beta Upsilon chapter can justifiably continue to boast a strong financial situation. The budget for fiscal 1983-84, prepared by last year's treasurer Kenneth J. Shine '85, calls for total House expenditures of \$133,870. This amount may be broken down into three major categories. House expenses, such as rent payments to the Beta Upsilon Association, and water, gas, and utility bill payments, account for \$58,600. Food expenses this year should total \$53,570. Chapter expenses, including the social, rush, and house manager budgets, account for the remaining \$21,700. This term the 29 Brothers and 12 pledges living in the House will pay \$356 monthly housebills. These cover all chapter and House costs, as well as 17 meals per week prepared by Paul Daigle, our cook.

Although the House can presently pay its bills as they are received, a laxness among some Brothers in paying their housebills may someday cause cash flow problems. We will soon decide whether or not to implement a stricter system of scaled fines to encourage timely payment of housebills. The House also may soon abolish its present no-interest, no-service charge checking account. A fixed amount (about \$2000) of this money would be transferred into an interest-bearing (5¼%) savings account, and the rest (\$3000-5000) would go into an interest-bearing business checking account requiring service charge payments. Alumni advice on this, or similar reorganizations of our accounts would be greatly appreciated.

As treasurer, I also hope to keep a close eye on other House officers, making sure that their expenditures are justifiable and within their budgetry constraints. Only with careful planning and avoidance of wasteful spending can our chapter remain financially sound.

# New Heating System Installed

I am happy to report that down parkas will not need to be worn in the Main House this winter. Due to the much appreciated support of our alumni, we have been able to complete the installation of a new heating system. This system cost approximately \$15,000, and replaces the system that came with the House when it was acquired by the Fraternity in 1946. Replacing the old and dilapidated system is a new hot water heater and storage tank, a more efficient and compact burner, and in each room forced hot water baseboards. Those who remember frigid temperatures in the back of the House know how much this long-awaited improvement is valued.

Among other notes of interest is our new mascot, a dogwood tree on the front lawn of the Annex, as well as a new washing machine to replace the old one, which self-destructed this summer. Also dedicated this fall was the Annex Pub in the basement. The 24-hour pub features beer-on-tap (actually a vending machine which serves canned beer as well as soda), seating for 12 on new built-in sofas, and refreshing conversation with other Betas during those much-needed study breaks.

We are looking forward to a productive January Work Week, during which the Annex will receive its annual repairs and renovations.
