



## Alumni Donations Aid House Improvements

I'm proud to report that a good deal of improvements have been made in the past six months. The all-house work week preceding our fall rush was very productive. We even had a team of brothers up to their knees in mud, rolling in new sod for the front lawn! I cannot remember the house ever looking so good. This term has seen a renewed effort at fire safety and prevention, and our treasurer has informed me that the new heating system installed just over a year ago has already saved us close to \$6,000.

The improvements on the kitchen have been completed, after many hours of labor produced by several brothers, and financial support from the chapter Alumni Association. This assistance included funds to purchase a new gas stove to replace the existing one, which our cook rumors to be over 20 years old. Several other major projects for which funding has been approved include inspection and repair work for all three fire escapes, insulated exterior glass doors for the library, and hiring an electrical contractor to rewire the annex at 120 Bay State Rd. Bids are currently being accepted from firms for these three projects.

Two large donations for physical improvement of the house have been received recently: 1) a bequest of \$3,000 from the estate of ERIC C. HOFMAN '27. This is supposed to be used to purchase a new piano for the main house. A 1903 Chickering grand is currently under consideration; and 2) a bequest from CLIVE LACY '15 to be used to purchase furniture for the annex living room. We appreciate the generosity of these gentlemen and their concern for the upkeep of our chapter house.

I am looking forward to this January's pledge work week—there will be 12 pledges and several brothers working on the annex, sanding and refinishing the landings, installing carpeting, painting, and renovating the bathrooms. I know that we'll all benefit from this much-needed work period.
