The strong turnout at this event ensured that the rest of the weekend would also be a success.

It was learned just prior to the weekend that Everett S. Coldwell, a founding member of Beta Upsilon, had, through his estate, made a gift of \$10,000 to the chapter. Brother Coldwell was one of the founding fathers of our chapter in 1913, and his name is familiar to many Betas, as they repeated it many times during their pledge period.

A committee of Beta Upsilon members is currently considering an appropriate memorial to Brother Coldwell and welcomes any suggestions from members.

Combined Efforts Keep Beta House In Excellent Condition

The excellent condition of the Beta house at this time is due in part to the labor of Cliff Merchant '91. A few days prior to the beginning of work week, the house was informed that our house manager was not going to return in time to supervise the operation. Cliff stepped forward, assumed the position of house manager, and did a tremendous job of making the house shine for rush week. The most impressive addition to the house during work week was the 270-cubic-foot walk-in refrigerator installed in the kitchen.

I was elected house manager shortly after school started. At that time, the 75th anniversary was less than two weeks away, and both houses were in disarray from the combined effects of rush week and people moving into their rooms. During this short time span, I posted one pledge and two house cleanups to bring our home back up to par. A good deal of credit for getting the houses cleaned up has to go to the pledges, who did an outstanding job. I also have to thank my wrenchmen, John Sell '91 and Cliff Merchant '91, for putting in a lot of time on some large repair jobs. The efforts of these men are greatly appreciated.

Since the 75th anniversary, my efforts have been geared toward fire safety measures. Deficiencies are being corrected with the help of my wrenchmen and through pledge cleanups. In order to reduce fire hazards, I am creating a monthly fire inspection list for both houses. This list includes the location of fire extinguishers, the operation of fire alarms, sprinklers, and emergency lights, and the state of general housekeeping. This list will reduce fire risk and make life easier for future house managers, who will be able to make thorough and efficient house inspections.

Pledge Program Nears Completion





Andrew Obst '91 and James Kalamas '91 fix banister posts during work week in late August.










A Brother Responds To The 75th Anniversary

On October 17, the following letter was received from Brother Walter Massey '51. It is dated October 8, 1988.

Dear Brothers:

First, I want to thank all the Beta alumni whom I was fortunate enough to contact from my class of '51 for coming to the 75th reunion! What a delight to renew Beta friendships from those very special years we shared after BU's reactivation following World War II—not just from the class of '51, but *all* those special Beta spirits that united in planting such a solid, joyous foundation for all the years to come.

I was terribly sorry not to be able to attend the whole reunion myself—especially to miss seeing those brothers who could attend only those occasions after I left late Saturday afternoon. My apologies to them—and, in particular, Bob Donovan '51, who attended especially to see me. So sorry, Brother Bob!—I really did want to see you, too, but.... At least you met my better half in Sharman! I thank all the attentive brothers for looking after her so well—She adored you all and didn't want to go home!

Congratulations to Seth Davis and all his helpers in setting up such a terrific, satisfying, and happy reunion. It proved one point: Class reunions (MIT's 25th and 35th for '51, for example) are all well and good. But they are only for one's own class. We all know that Betas cross class lines and make friends from all years from freshman to senior (e.g., a freshman Beta will know four different freshman years plus one of each of sophomore, junior, and senior years). Seven years are represented in classes with whom he will be acquainted, yet MIT reunions bring together, for obvious statistical reasons, only his own class. How much we lose in not even meeting with our other friends and brothers! Proof is the excitement and noise generated on the Friday night when, on the dot, 75 years of Betas descended on the Quality Inn Library Suite and cheerfully searched out long-sought Betas of times gone by. What a din! So much was to be exchanged that there wasn't even time for a song—too much to talk about. Too much to catch up. When, then, is the answer? And "between trips" I squeezed in a lot of TV and film performances "to keep the ball rolling"—all this from the first of August to mid-October. Only now do I get to catch up on my correspondence.

So, dear brothers, many thanks for being in Boston. It was wonderful to see you all again. Truly wonderful. Our Beta days were so important in my life. I thank each and every one of you for your gift.p
