

# Anniversary Celebration And Gift Highlight Past Year At Beta

We are pleased to report, as the forsythia reminds us that another year has passed, that the chapter and the Beta Upsilon Association continue in excellent condition.

The highlight of the year clearly was the very successful 75th anniversary celebration of the founding of the chapter. Many of the brothers who attended expressed a hope that such a gathering might be held every five years or so, and we consider this a real possibility. Probably our second highlight was the receipt of the \$10,000 gift from the estate of Brother Everett S. Coldwell, one of the founders of the chapter in 1913. For those of you in the mood and with the resources, a testamentary gift is an excellent way to help the association.

We have recently passed papers on a three percent loan from the MIT IRDF. The primary purpose of the loan is to modernize the wiring at 119 Bay State Road, as well as to replace the front doors on both houses and keep our furniture inventory up-todate. # Four Betas Contribute To MIT's Winning Basketball Season

It was quite a year for athletics at Beta Upsilon and at MIT. The biggest news is that the MIT men's basketball team posted its winningest season since 1967-'68, when it also had a record of 16-9 for the season. In addition, this year's basketball team also saw as many as four Betas in the game at a time! These men were tri-captain Mike Casagrande '89 (Danbury, CT), Dave Della-Grote '90 (Winchester, MA), D. Chris Sonne '91 (Salt Lake City, UT), and Mike Duffy '92 (Cleveland, OH). Casagrande and Della-Grote were regular starters for the entire season, while Sonne was one of the first men off the bench. Duffy played about 20 minutes per game when he wasn't sidelined with an injury during the middle of the season. At the conclusion of the season, Casagrande and Della-Grote received the Larry Grabin Award for extraordinary contribution to the program and the Coaches Award for dedication and hustle, respectively.

All of the home games were well attended by the brothers of Beta Upsilon, who were even a major cheering force at some of the away games as far away as Worcester. Congratulations; we all look forward to next year!

## Athletics Part Of Beta Life

As always, athletics is very much a part of the Beta experience at the Beta Upsilon Chapter. This year, there was quite a combination of varsity, intramural, and doing-it-by-themselves athletes. The varsity roster was as follows:

Every Beta participated in one or more of the following intramural sports: soccer, ultimate frisbee, ping pong, basketball, ice hockey, softball, volleyball, football, and water polo. Although no championships were brought home this year, many of our teams were very competitive.

In the on-their-own category were some brothers boasting of feats of endurance. In September 1988, Mike DeCavalcante '87 (New York, NY) competed in the Cape Cod Ironman triathlon. He completed the 2.4-mile swim, 112-mile bike, and 26.2-mile run in 10% hours. He places 44th out of 500 in the field and fourth in his age group. The top two in each age group qualified for the famous Hawaii Ironman triathlon.

Also competing in endurance races were Mike McGovern '89 (Colonia, NJ) and Alex Chachkes '91 (East Greenwich, RI). In November, Mike placed 14th out of 400 overall in the Harrisburg, Pennsylvania, marathon in his third best time of 2:46:33. Then in April Mike and Alex competed in the Boston Marathon, where temperatures reached 70 degrees along the course. Alex, running in his first marathon, completed the race in 3:29:11. Mike, in his seventh marathon, finished in 2:50:51 for an overall place of 478th.

that we had used for other major work in the recent past. We are in good financial condition, primarily due to the generosity of the alumni over the years.




- Ben Silverman '88 (mechanical engineering, Pittsburgh, PA) is also receiving two degrees and will work in General Electric's manufacturing management program.




