
#### Appearance of Beta House **Improves Significantly**

In past months the appearance of the Beta house has been improved significantly thanks to the effort and generosity of both actives and alumni. A custom-built white oak front door and frame was installed on the main house just in time for rush week. The annex received a matching front door. Brothers did an excellent job finishing the doors during fall work week. The golden oak doors with brass hardware have received widespread praise.

In addition to finishing the doors and the usual work week painting, brothers redid the wallpaper in the library and the fourth-floor bathroom in the main house. We would like to thank recent graduate Mike McGovern '89 for his help laying the one-piece Solarian floor.

Unfortunately, at the end of October, disaster struck as the annex's hot water heater exploded. After some comparison shopping and after a few showers across the street, the unit was replaced.

If all goes well, the main house will be fully rewired by the spring as was the annex in 1985. We have received an excellent bid for the job and are now finalizing details of the proposal. In addition to providing the convenience of adequate lighting and outlets, the job will increase the safety of the Beta house. The fire detection, alarm, and emergency lighting system will be brought up to building code, and dangerous, dated, and do-it-yourself wiring currently in use will be eliminated.

#### Athletic Interest And Support At An All-Time High

At Beta this year athletic enthusiasm and participation have increased. Almost half the brothers are active in a sport at MIT. Our intramural teams are improved, as support and interest are at an all-time high. This fall, Will Scruggs '92 started as a sweeper for the varsity soccer team. His solid play along with the leadership of Tuan Elstrom '91, whose season was cut short with a stress fracture, helped the soccer team to a competitive 5-6-3 record.

Nathan Cultice '92 continued playing varsity baseball in the fall season. He is the starting catcher in only his

second year at MIT.

Varsity lacrosse held fall workouts, and Kenneth Chay '91, Todd Simson '92, and Steven Hao '92 each participated. Chay is coming off a solid season in which he scored 20 goals and had 10 assists in helping the team to a 7-6 record. This is Simson's second year of play and Hao's first.

Mike Bowers '92 has continued as third skipper for the varsity sailing team. He has become a clutch team member by frequently competing well in major regattas.

Beta participation has increased in MIT crew; four brothers are involved. Erik Mott '90 rowed on the varsity lightweight boat. Neil Harrigan '90 was a member of the first freshman heavyweight boat and now is looking to improve to varsity this spring. Freshmen Godard Abel '93 and Frank Leibley '93 rowed crew for the first time on the freshman boats.

John Sell '91, Cliff Merchant '91, and Randy West '93 are each on the varsity wrestling team this year. Sell and West each wrestle at 190 pounds, and Merchant competes at 167 pounds.

Andrew Obst '90 was active this year with the rugby club team. He played wing-forward as the team finished

with a 3-3 record.

Dave DellaGrote '90, Chris Sonne '91, and Michael Duffy '92 return to the varsity basketball team this year. After a successful season last year, each player will start in games, which are often avidly attended by Betas.

Beta participation also increased in fall intramural sports. Beta entered an A-league football team and was extremely competitive. Due to the outstanding play by graduate student Stephen Ponzio'88 at quarterback and an excellent defensive line, the season was both challenging and a lot of fun. One game in particular was decided by a last-second fourth-down pass that broke a scoreless tie and led the Betas to victory.

An octathon team was entered this fall and fell victim to bad timing. After impressively winning the first six events, the team suffered a shortage of players, some of whom had to meet other obligations. As a result, we dropped in the standings. The octathon team's experience was very positive, though; playing eight different sporting events in 12 days was extremely challenging.

The B-league soccer team was successful this year, accumulating a 3-1-1 record. Avid participation by the

house in this sport was very pleasing.

We are now in the midst of B- and C-league basketball and C- and D-league hockey seasons. The B-league basketball team, in particular, has hopes of winning the B-league trophy. With the leadership of Alex Virgilio '92, Andrew

chance of meeting some of the general officers, including B. Hume Morris, and with some of Beta Upsilon's alumni, including Walter Massey, who is now district chief of the Canadian chapters. Spirits were high, and it was great to see over 1,000 Betas at the convention.

We were impressed by the talent displayed by several of the chapters in the singing and talent contests. During the award ceremonies it was inspiring to listen to some of the great achievements made by other chapters. The high point of the convention, however, was when our chapter was awarded the Sisson Award, which is the highest award a chapter can receive. To our knowledge, this was the first time that Beta Upsilon has received this most prestigious award.

The general now has high expectations from us. It was related to us that the strength of our chapter is one of the footholds that Beta has in the Northeast, since District I was devastated with suspension of chapter charters. The general has asked us to aid in the recolonization of Yale, and we hope to lead the effort. Also, the general has asked us to perform the model initiation during the upcoming spring regional leadership conference. We are honored by having the privilege to do so, and we aspire to live up to the general's expectations.

Beta Upsilon continues to be a leader on its own initiative, as well. We organized a regional symposium with the help of District Chief Robert Clarke. Unfortunately, the responses we received from other chapters were poor, and the symposium was canceled. However, we have hosted parties for several chapters, including McGill, Columbia, and Cornell. Our social reputation is as high as ever, and it is always a pleasure for us to share a Loving Cup or two with other chapters.

Last, we have continued our efforts to provide a role model of behavior for other chapters at MIT. Our neighbor relations have much improved from the past few years, and our alcohol awareness has greatly increased. Our liability risks are diminishing as our sense of responsibility increases. We foresee no problems on our horizon, and we will undoubtedly grow even stronger.




