We now have a \$60,000 mortgage with the IRDF at 3 percent interest. The cost of our safety upgrades to an institute-prescribed level, which is above the standard building codes, is approximately \$40,000. We expect to borrow half of that from the IRDF at 3 percent, and we expect to pay the other half from our reserves.



The house remained in excellent condition during the fall semester. Besides some small purchases for minor repairs, the only big-ticket item was a new dryer. Lundermac also did a substantial amount of *probono* work to keep the washing machine in perfect working order for most of the semester.
