

Pledge Work Week '96: An Impressive Success

Pledge work week 1996 was yet another success under the sage leadership of outgoing House Managers Peter Berger '97 and Chris McMillan '98. Although there were some initial doubts as to the mechanical inclination of our newest pledge class, they impressed everyone, themselves included, with their achievements over the week. Highlights include a new tile floor in the annex basement, a new ceiling in the annex first-floor common area, and renovated annex bathrooms. New sinks on the second and third floor and a renovated toilet and new prefab shower in the second-floor bathroom were quickly connected to 100 feet of new plumbing installed over IAP by newly elected House Manager Drew Mutch '98. In the basement bathroom, Bryan Morrissey '98, the other new house manager, has spent hundreds of hours lovingly hand-crafting a concrete, fiberglass, and ceramic tile shower-to-end-all-showers. The next time you are in the annex, you should stop by and admire his masterpiece.

In the main house, the kitchen was brightened by the installation of new lights, and the walk-in is now better equipped to store milk with a custom-made milk shelving unit. Weary pub dwellers are pleased to use the new pine-log bench made from a remnant of the

For the first time since it was installed, the alarm system has been working properly—no false alarms—for more that a month now. Unfortunately, such is not the case for much of the plumbing. Many of the original brass pipes in the annex are badly corroded and have been breaking with distressing regularity. The main sewer line in the main house has also been troublesome, with several blockages. We look forward to remedying these problems in the coming months so the house is in good mechanical order for rush next August.

We are also in the process of making two major improvements to the annex structure. A new alley door will eliminate the cold draft previously experienced by basement dwellers and a potential security problem from the failing latch. Four floors up, we are now talking to contractors about laying a new rubber roof over the front of the annex to eliminate leaks in the third front rooms.

House Financial Situation Improves; Roof Renovation Targeted

The Beta Upsilon finances have been a subject of confusion and a battle for the chapter for the better part of the school year. The major cause has been MIT's failure to deliver financial aid in a prompt, efficient manner. However, due to an irate treasurer and the hostile takeover of the MIT financial aid office, our situation is finally improving.

The annex electric bill still torments me every month. Our outstanding balance of just over \$7,000 seems to be reasonable to Boston Edison, although it baffles me. After a couple of phone conversations with them, they are once again "looking into it." Meanwhile, the residents of the annex are prepared for loss of power at any moment.

We are currently looking into renovating the annex roof this

spring, in order to attack at the source the water damage problems that occur throughout the house. Then we would be able to effectively repair rotting ceilings and walls without them being ruined immediately afterward. In general, Betas will be dryer and happier.

Our current goal is to eliminate all outstanding debts to the house and become financially solid to facilitate an effective summer rush. We would like to thank the alumni for their patience with us throughout the first term and for offering their help in the future.
