From The Association President

On Fire Safety And Boston **University Expansion**

At this time 12 months ago, most, if not all, of the MIT fraternities in Boston were faced with the same problem: obtaining a fire escape inspection certificate for each house they owned. These certificates are valid for a period of five years. Having the certificate enables a student house manager to schedule an appointment for an egress inspection, which, when successful, leads to the issuance of the lodging house license required for student occupancy.

The city of Boston's heightened interest in fire safety was the result of an unfortunate incident at a fraternity house in another state that resulted in the loss of life. From the standpoint of comparing that facility's condition to the standards we maintain, please be assured that we comply with a stringent

I'm happy to report that, thanks to a teamwork effort on the part of the house corporation and the chapter, as well as good advice from a professional engineering firm I hired, we were able to take a situation that potentially could have cost us about \$25,000 and address targeted repairs for a total cost of under \$5,000. It was a process we started in earnest in mid-July 1996 and ended the afternoon rush started.

The experience resulted in more direct contact between the chapter and the house corporation than the chapter has been used to and caused some

From The House Manager

House Improvements Continue During Spring Term

This past term has seen a lot of work done to the house. Pledge work week, guided by House Manager Drew Mutch '98, took place at the end of IAP as always. The focus of the week was the complete gutting and renovation of second rear right and third rear left of the annex. The pledges learned a lot about carpentry and dry wall.

In place of the wire conduit that formerly ran along the walls, the new rooms feature behind-the-wall wiring with inset, flush-mount outlets for electric, telephone, and Ethernet connections. The rooms also feature new light fixtures with ceiling fans.

The election of wrenchmen Jaydeep Bardhan '00, Alex Rodriguez '00, and Alan Krasnick '00 allowed the completion of many small projects (such as the building of shelves in the wrenchman's closet and the replacement of many cracked or broken window panes) and helped prepare the house for the annual fire inspection.

Work continues on the annex reroofing project under the guidance of Michael Johnson '80, alumni association president. Projects for the summer and fall include replacement of part of the ceilings on the first and third floor of the annex.

The front room in the basement of the annex was recently renovated to bring it up to fire code. The renovation work consisted primarily of adding additional drywall to the wall between basement front and the wrenchman's closet.

Other projects for the summer include rebuilding the back stairs to the kitchen in the main house, routine maintenance to rooms in the annex, and the possible construction of an annex roof deck or addition to the main house deck.



ping traffic. People living in the house often announce cleanups, house tours for summer boarders, IM sports events, and so forth on betas-active.
